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# PROGRAMME of the English language interview for foreign citizens

The purpose of the interview is to determine the level of a foreign citizen's command of the English language, which is sufficient / not sufficient to complete successfully the program of study.

### Sample questions for an introductory interview

- 1. Tell us about yourself. Where and when were you born? Where did you go to school? What are your hobbies and interests? Do you have a big family? How many people are in there? List the members of your family and tell us a little about each of them. What traditions do you have in your family?
- 2. Tell us about your chosen profession. Why did you choose this job? What do you like about it? What qualities do you need to be a good specialist in your chosen profession?
- 3. Tell us about the higher education system in your country. What is the structure of university education in your country? How many years do you usually study at university? Which subjects are more popular in your country? Do students enjoy studying? What are the traditions of higher education in your country?
- 4. What do you know about higher education in Belarus? What do you think are the similarities and differences between higher education in your country and in the Republic of Belarus? What do you know about the universities in Belarus? What do you know about Vitebsk State Technological University, its history and achievements?
- 5. Tell us about a friend or acquaintance of yours. How long have you known them? What does he or she look like? What is his/her character like? Where and when was he or she born? What is his/her family like? Where did he/she go to school? What does he/she do now? Why are you interested in this person? Why do you find him/her appealing? Do you often see each other? Do you write letters or messages to each other?
- 6. Why is it important to learn languages? Is it hard to learn foreign languages? What is the best way to learn languages? How do you learn languages in your country? What languages do you know? What other languages would you like to learn? What difficulties do you have in learning English?
- 7. Tell us how you spend your free time. What do you like to do in your free time? What are the traditions of spending free time in your home country? What do your friends from Belarus like to do in their free time? Do you like to read? What books do you read? Tell us about your favourite book. Do you like sports? What kind of sport do you like? Why? Do you like to travel? Tell us about one of your trips.
  - 8. Tell us about your birthplace. Where is this place? Why do you like this place?
  - 9. Tell us about the most important fact in the history of the Republic of Belarus.
- 10. Tell about a famous Belarusian writer (poet), artist or musician. What is this person known for? When did he/she live? What works did he/she write? How well known are his/her works in your country?

## SECTION 1 "Module of general knowledge of English as a foreign language". List of issues for oral communication:

- Biography (a story about yourself, friend, acquaintance, relative); interests and hobbies; description of appearance.

- Family (a story about the family; where the family lives; marital status, financial security, work, interests and hobbies of family members; description of their appearance).
- Study and work (place of study or work, choice of profession, specialisation, motivation for choice).
- Foreign languages in the modern world, their role and importance in human life; learning English.
- Educational system in the learner's country and in Belarus): school system, higher education system, learner's free time: leisure, interests and hobbies.
- Working day, free time, rest, holidays, interests, hobbies (sport, music, theatre, painting, excursions, travelling).
- Country, city, people: geographical location, climate, nature and natural resources, history and culture, state and political structure of the country; population of the country; main occupations of the population; the history of Belarus; cultural and historical monuments, places of interest; capital of the Republic of Belarus; general characteristics of the city; historical and cultural monuments.
  - Living standards, people, society; traditions, customs, national holidays.
  - Health system. Achievements of modern medicine.
  - Seasons, weather, climate.
  - Man and woman. Relationship, marriage and family issues.
  - There are no uninteresting people in the world.
  - The unique student life. Youth and its problems.
  - Man and society.
  - Man and politics. Portraits of state and political figures and evaluation of their activities.
  - Man and the economy. The economy and its role in the life of society.
- Man and science. Scientists and society. Science and society. The world of science and technology.
  - The major scientific discoveries of the twentieth century.
  - Famous personalities of science and culture.
  - Man and art. Art and society. Man's spiritual and aesthetic development.
- Man and nature. Global ecology: environmental problems, environmental protection, national and state conservation programmes.
  - Global problems of modernity.
- Man and space exploration. Extraterrestrial civilisations: speculations, hypotheses and credibility.
